Camp Agawam

Camp Agawam is the 11th oldest scout camp in the Boy Scouts of America, and currently is the 8th oldest active scout camp. Thru out its 92 year history, Camp Agawam has and still to this day, provides camp program close to home. Located in Lake Orion, MI, in the northern portion of the Great Lakes Council, Camp Agawam provides camping opportunities to Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Venture Crews. Agawam has 2 heated cabins and 10 tent sites & dining hall rental.

Camp Agawam host many activities including: Woodbadge, Jumping Jack Frost, Trade-or-rees, and countless camp opportunities in BB Guns, archery, swimming, boating, fishing, and trailblazer days. Camp Agawam is also home to the Great lakes Council's Chief Pontiac Programs. Stop by Camp Agawam, for a weekend full of fun, friendship, and activities.

Cole Canoe Base

Cole Canoe Base (CCB) is constantly re-inventing ways to keep today's ever changing youth active in the outdoors. Our program is "High Adventure for the 21st Century." Providing activities for the Scout that is new to the program all the way up to Venturers and Sea Scouts that "Have tried everything." Our camp parallels programs found at national Boy Scout camps for a fraction of the price. CCB boasts a 88% unit return rate, one of the highest in the nation. As an "A rated" nationally accredited camp since it was renamed over 30 years ago, CCB has gained national attention for it's brand of safe, quality, fun filled programming!

Units looking for more adventure will enjoy weekend camping at Cole Canoe Base. CCB is located approximately 3 hours north of Detroit near Alger, Michigan. Nestled next to the beautiful Rifle River in Ogemaw county. Cole's 1480 acres provides a magnificent setting for hiking, camping and "up north" fun.

CCB has **17 tent sites and 1 winterized cabin** (White Pines 24 capacity) that are available to rent for off season camping. CCB is for Boy Scout troops, Venturing crews, and Explorer posts including co-ed units. CCB Offers Canoeing, kayaking, climbing, bouldering, shooting sports, snow shoeing, rump bumping.

D-BAR-A SCOUT RANCH

Since 1950, **D-bar-A Scout Ranch** has been providing quality-scouting experiences for Scouts from Southeast Michigan and around the Mid-west. Located a little over an hour's drive north of Detroit, the ranch boast over 1,700 acres of wilderness.

D-bar-A Scout Ranch is one of only a handful of Boy Scout Camps that is also a working ranch. It is also the only working ranch east of the Mississippi. The ranch has over 35 horses, 2 mules, 5 burros, and 15 long horn steer. Every weekend the ranch offers trail rides and corral rides for a modest fee. Want more than just a weekend? Try out a week long Yucca Trail or Ranch Hand programs. Where else can you go camping, and have the opportunity to go horse back riding with out leaving camp?

D-bar-A Scout Ranch host many activities including: Wood badge, NYLT, Haunted Forest, Spring Fling, Trail to Eagle, Shooting Sports Days, and countless camp opportunities where emphasize outdoor program that you can't get at home; BB guns, archery, swimming, boating, fishing, climbing, bouldering, as well as 28 heated cabins, and 14 tents sites, a camporee area and so much more.

LOST LAKE SCOUT RESERVATION

Lost Lake Scout Reservation (LLSR), was purchased in 1965 and the first summer camp was held a year later in 1966. The camp has provided and continues thru today, a unique wilderness summer camp experience to 10,000 plus Scouts. There are 16 year round cabins, that house from 4 to 24 people, 8 tree houses, 17 tent sites and 4 winter thermal shelters. LLSR provides a camping need for all that attend. The Chippy Trail circles the entire camp in a ten mile trail; there is also a five mile trail for those less adventurous. In the 2400 acres, a Scout can catch a fish, swim a mile, identify a tree and wildlife, and develop strong value ethical decision while becoming a better citizen.

LLSR hosts many activities including: mushroom hunting, \$10,000 pike fishing contest, ice fishing derby, maple sugar bush days, dog sledding weekends, and countless camp opportunities in climbing, bouldering, swimming, COPE, boating, and so much more.
